As they drove hurriedly over 13-mile route from nearby Inman, bound for the hospital, Wanda Kay was born while she sat beside him in the car's front seat.

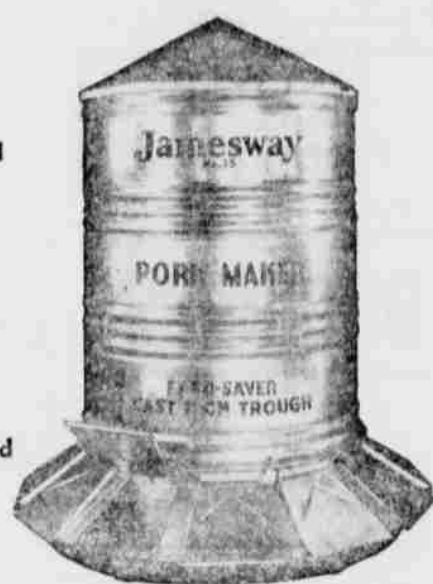
"I didn't want us to have a wreck," she explained, "so I did not tell my husband the baby was coming. After it was born I told him there wasn't any need to hurry."
