

This year, 1959, all taxpayers, in Cass County, will be required to report to an assessor for their personal assessment beginning March 1.

IT IS EACH TAXPAYER'S RESPONSIBILITY TO HAVE HIS OR HER SCHEDULE ON FILE IN THE COUNTY ASSESSOR'S OFFICE BY APRIL 20th. ALL SCHEDULES MADE AFTER APRIL 20th WILL BE PENALIZED.

Persons owning taxable personal property of any kind, tangible or intangible, must make a report. Unlicensed motor vehicles and trailers should be included as personal property

Stockholders in corporations should know the correct number of shares and whether stock is common or preferred. We are instructed to penalize all shares of stock added by this office.

Persons between the ages of 21 and 50 are assessed for the Head tax.

Any Fireman claiming to be exempt from assessment and payment of poll tax shall claim such exemption at the time of making his personal assessment or shall lose the exemption for the year.

Rural taxpayers, PLEASE know your school district number, your section, township and range

Due to Legislative investigation of business schedules, an assessor will call on all business places to assist in making out the schedule. Please have the necessary information available.

You may make your assessment at any of the following locations:
