Heart Disease, a Killer

Heart disease is rapidly becoming the chief cause of death in the United States. being far ahead of cancer, the second on the list of diseases which kill the greatest number of people in the United States every year.

Concerning heart disease, a recognied authority reports that coronary sclerosis is sometime called the "disease of the intelligentsia" because of the susceptibility of physicians, bankers, lawyers and clergymen. The characteristics of the disease, including the hardening of the nerves, ligaments and blood vessels around the heart, and its incidence, is highest among those who do mental work and lowest among those who do manual labor.

The Plattsmouth Journal naturally hesitates to attempt any conclusion from these observations, but, apparently, the disease attacks individuals who are prone to forget the importance of physical exercise while consuming their energies in the anxiety of mental worries. It would therefore appear that, somewhere along the line of popular education in this country, the physical nature of man has been neg-

If this is true, and we believe it is, we might save the lives of future professional men in this community by stressing athletic interests during childhood, with the hope that, when these individuals reach maturity, they will have sense enough to continue what has been wisely begun.
