### **Body of Woman** Drowned Feb. 14 Found Tuesday

The body of a woman who drowned in the Missouri River here Feb. 14 was found Tuesday six miles north of Nebraska City.

Mrs. Clara Marie Lawrence, 37, disappeared onto the river ice here at 11:15 a.m. Feb. 14 after a guarrel with a companion. She was presumed drowned. No search of the river was possible then because of drifting ice floes.

Tuesday, the body was positively identified as that of Mrs. Lawrence by her brother Robert Shafer and Sheriff Tom Solomon and then returned to Plattsmouth.

Co. Attorney James Begley, acting as coroner, ruled the death 'suicide.'

Ed Crume, a Nebraska City fisherman, found the body. According to the sheriff, it had been well preserved by the cold river water. It is assumed the rise in the river the first two




