Good management of the laying house is necessary this time of year to ensure production of clean eggs. Rain, snow and high moisture conditions lead to a damp laying house. Preventing sweet clover weevil damage to spring seeded sweet clover is more reliable than spraying later after most of the damage has been done to seeding.
