## Grass Seeding Proves Popular In Soil Bank

Nearly 74 acres out of every 100 acres of cropland in the Conservation Reserve of the Soil Bank through 1950 are being planted to grass, according to Honor M. Ochsner, chairman of the Nebraska Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee.

Seeding Conservation Reserve land to grass was by far the most popular conservation use. The planting of forest trees with almost 11 acres out of 100 acres scheduled for tree planting.

Farmers in the 423 Great Plains counties expected to plant 4,414,000 acres of grass through 1958. The balance of nearly three million acres is to be planted outside the Great Plains.

Nebraska contributed 127,639 acres to the total of 4,414,000 acres of newly planted grass, Ochsner reported.
