The hostess served lunch, assisted by Darleen Stratton and Margaret Zierott.

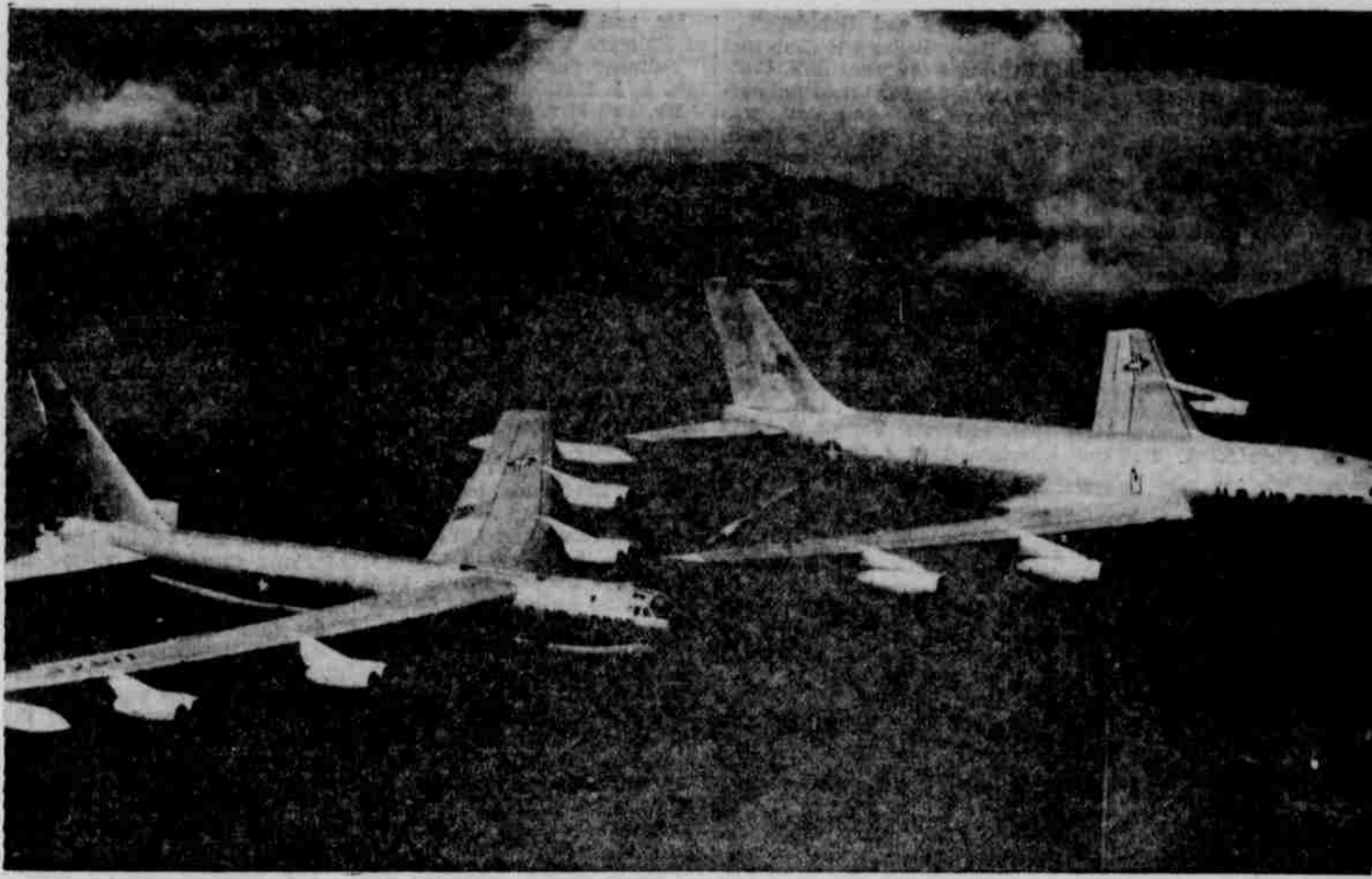
Instead of a June meeting the club will have a picnic on June 14 at 6:30 at the Elmwood Park.

Aircraft of both types will be among a special display at Offutt during the three-day Frontier Fiesta, May 29-31.
