Next meeting will be June 2 at 7 p.m. at the home of Carolyn Piner. — Sandra Meisinger, reporter.

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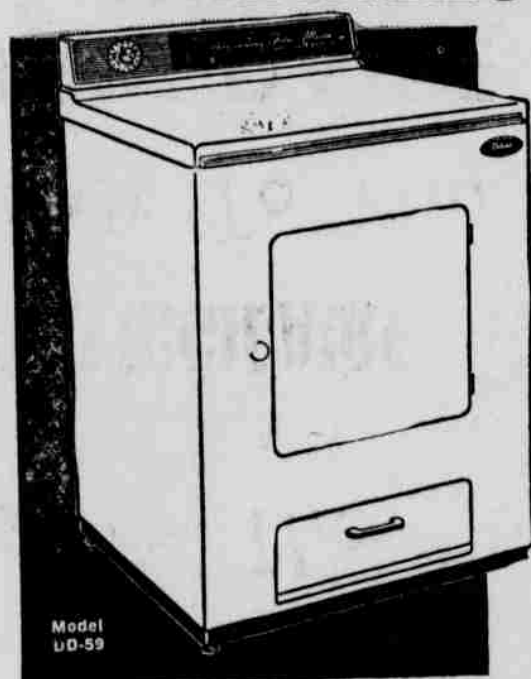
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
