Guests of the club were, Vic Schreiner, John Schreiner Jr., Albert Young and Fay Jose.

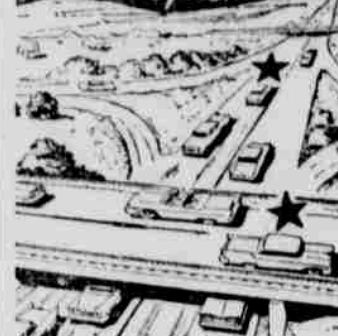
## Voyagers Confer on Forthcoming Week
