## Market Hog Entries Due This Month

OMAHA — Entries for the second annual Omaha Market Hog Show, February 6, should be submitted during the month of January, according to R. E. Cunningham, secretary of the Omaha Livestock Exchange and chairman of the show committee. Entry forms will be available through County Extension Agents, vocational agriculture teachers or commission firms operating on the Omaha market.

The Show calls for a 10-head entry, fall-farrowed barrows and sows (not more than five gilts), in gross weight range of 1,900 to 2,400 pounds. The exhibitor may designate one barrow from his entry, for separate individual competition. There will be two weight classes in individual competition — 190 to 215 pounds

and 216 to 240 pounds. Individual winners will move into the carcass competition. Certification data will be available on request for all hogs entered in the Omaha Show. Those desiring certification on individual hogs should fill out the required forms. The forms should be delivered to the commission firms of the owner's choice and at the same time specifying the hog or hogs he seeks to have certified. The firm, in turn, will supply the completed forms to the packing packer buying the hogs. The regular certification charge will apply.
