## Windbreak Can Make Winter's

Chores Easier LINCOLN - Nebraska blizus that a good windbreak can eliminate large drifts around the farmstead where a farmer

does most of his winter chores. "Farmers can solve this problem by planting trees in the right places," points out Elis-worth Benson, Extension forester at the College of Agriculture.

"Many existing windbreaks that are not protecting the farmstead can, with minor changes, perform this function. In many cases, one row of red cedar planted to the north and west of the present windbreak can help correct the situation. Such a row should be planted the snow before it gets to the

farmstead area.' "Evergreens will afford a great deal of protection from snow drifts just five years after planting," according to Benson. County Extension Agents over Nebraska are taking orders for various kinds of windbreak trees for planting this spring. Additional information on wind-He is the grandson of Mr. and Richard C.
