Back To Railroads

Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey is going back to the railroads. The big circus is taking to the rails again after an experiment of three years, using buses and truck convoys.

It was thought - three years ago that buses and trucks would be a better mode of travel for the circus, especially since it had cut down its large menagerie of animals - except for elephants, zebras, horses, and eight lions and tigers.

However, it was found that our high way congestion of today was a greater problem than those which occurred on rails. Flat tires, traffic lights, and other complications, brought about the decision to return to the railroad cars. As a result, they will clatter up to New York City, to open the circus' annual Spring engage-ment on March 31st at Madison Square Garden.

Ironically, the incident occurs when increasing highway congestion is causing serious traffic snarl-ups in all parts of the country — even though the railroads are described by government experts as on the way out, as far as passenger travel is concerned. By 1970, passenger travel on the railroad, except in certain cases, will be virtually passe.

For those who love the railroads, for railroaders, and for all those who love the tradition and folklore of railroads and trains, this is bitter reading. However, the circus - which itself was said to be doomed only a few years ago - has returned to the railroads, and maybe this is an omen of good for railroad fans. Recent air crash have not done the railroads any harm, as far as passenger travel is concerned, either.


