Civil Defense Test Provides Rotarians Food for Thought

Civil Defense 2 col 2-24
The Rotary Club Tuesday noon heard the nationwide Civil Defense Conelrad test at its regular meeting at the Lions Community Building.

The test setup and manner of presentation approximated procedure to be followed if an actual disaster or defense alert were in effect.

All radio and television stations left the air at 12 noon local time for one-half hour. During this time, information on operation of the alert and of the need for such an exercise was given by regional and national Civil Defense officials. President Eisenhower spoke briefly.

Leo Hoegh, national Civil Defense director, said the theme of the alert and of the Civil Defense program is "A Prepared Family Leads to a Protected Nation."

Conelrad frequencies, the only operative air channels during the test are radio 640 and 1240. These would be the only ones operating during an actual emergency also.

J. Howard Davis was program chairman for the Rotary meeting and arranged to have radios for listening. He had asked Sheriff Tom Solomon to attend to speak briefly about Cass County Civil Defense but the sheriff was called away shortly before noon and couldn't be there.

Solomon, who is nominal Civil Defense director for the county, in a note to Davis said the county is in about the same situation as most Nebraska counties in regard to Civil Defense.

There are insufficient funds to actively prepare a disaster plan and implement it.

However, he said there are about 250 volunteer firemen in the county ready to help in an emergency; his office has boats in readiness for a water emergency; radio communications are always operative; and it is hoped 100 folding cots and blankets can be bought for use if needed.
