WEeping WATER (Special) — The Weeping Water City Council met on Tuesday evening for reorganization.

William Thornton, president of the Council, gave the oath of office to Fred Cherry, re-elected as mayor; Mr. Cherry then gave the oath of office to Leonard Doty, re-elected as second ward councilman and Gordon Henege re-elected as police judge.

John Robinson who was elected councilman for the first ward could not serve as he was found to be a resident of the 2nd ward. Mrs. W. L. Dwyer, city attorney, had studied the Nebraska statutes and had conferred with James Begley, county attorney and found that when an elected official is disqualified for any reason, the person receiving the next highest vote is not elected.

In such a case, the Mayor and the City Council will appoint a person to fill the vacancy. The three councilmen, Ivan Rector, Leonard Doty and William Thornton and Fred Cherry, mayor, then appointed Edward Van Horn to serve as councilman for a two year term.

Van Horn had served on the council the past two years. Thornton was re-elected as president of the Council.

This is not to imply, however, that Gidget is a girl of distorted proportions. Far from it, she is the Petite Sandra Dee and audiences everywhere will fall in love with her. Based on the novel by Frederick Kohner, the story of Gidget and her teenage friends is wholesome family entertainment, peppy and as youthful in spirit as the generation it depicts.
