

# **New Grain** Storage Rates

Auxiliary.

Begin July 1 A new schedule of storage rates to be paid for price-support grain stored in commercial warehouses and on farms will take effect on July 1, 1960, chairman, Ivan G. Althouse of the Cass County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation

Committee announced. For grain stored commercially, storage rates are being reduced an average of 19 precent. from about 1612 to 1312 cents a bushel on most grades. The rates will be the same for all

areas of the country. For most grain stored on farms under reseal programs, the storage payment to farmers will be two cents a bushel lower. Following are the new reseal storage rates per bushel, with cents (12); barley, 14 cents (16); wheat, 14 cents (17); grain sorghums per hundredweight,

24 cents (30). Reseal storage rates will also be uniform on a national basis, elminating former geographical
