While not settled, it seems that the Iowa highway commission has checked their first plan, that was to move the highway some distance from the Mills county seat.

The highway commission at Ames voted unanimously in favor of a motion by Commissioner Harold Teachout of Shenandoah for a different route than that announced previously, that would have moved the highway five miles south of Glenwood.

Representatives of the commission however stated that construction will start in 1963-64 on the proposed route so that 34 will be where it is now located for some time.
