Death of Cyrus A. Tyson 70, native of Cass county, and former resident of Elmwood and Plattsmouth, occurred Tuesday at Whittier, Calif., where he has made his home for a great many years. He had been ill all summer suffering from a heart ailment.

He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis A. Tyson, the father for many years operating a drug store at Elmwood, where "Cy" was born. The family later moved to Plattsmouth when Mr. Tyson was elected county clerk and where they resided several years. Cyrus was graduated from the Plattsmouth high school. Later on the expiration of Mr. L. A. Tyson's term as clerk the family returned to Elmwood. In later years Cyrus Tyson moved to the west coast where he and his family have since resided.

Surviving are the wife, Jane, son, James and three grandchildren, all of Whittier; two brothers, Floyd, Eaton, Colo.; Dr. R. W. Tyson, Murray; three sisters, Mrs. Marion McCrory, Elmwood; Mrs. James Brown, Eaton, Colo. and Mrs. Fleming Robb, Elmwood.

Funeral services were at the Christian church at Elmwood at 2 p.m. Sunday, with burial at the cemetery at that place.
