

Falls City Ups Stock Some More

Falls City upped its already soaring stock in the Twin Rivers Football Conference Friday night by thumping Auburn, 45-14, in a non-conference game on Auburn's own field.

Falls City led, 19-0, at the half, then added 13 points each the last two quarters while Auburn got 7 each of the last two.

Dave Wittrock threw two TD passes for Falls City, 18 and 14 yards to Dave Martin. Bruce Smith ran for three touchdowns.

In Twin Rivers Conference games, Fairbury and Nebraska City shocked Beatrice and Crete with the size of their winning scores.

Fairbury scored in every quarter to whip Beatrice 33-0, at Fairbury.

John Nesper scored on runs of 9 and 13 yards and Ken Stauss passed its home fans by pummeling Crete, 31-7.

Sam Carneal, a speedy veteran back, scored four touchdowns. His runs were 56, 28, 2 and 5 yards. The winners' 206-

ound fullback, John Moore, got the other score on a one-yard buck.

Nebraska City led 14-0 at half-time and 25-0 after three quarters.

Many here were looking ahead as this season started, viewing the game with Ryan as a possible "breather" for the Blue Devils in a rough schedule. The picture is changed now.

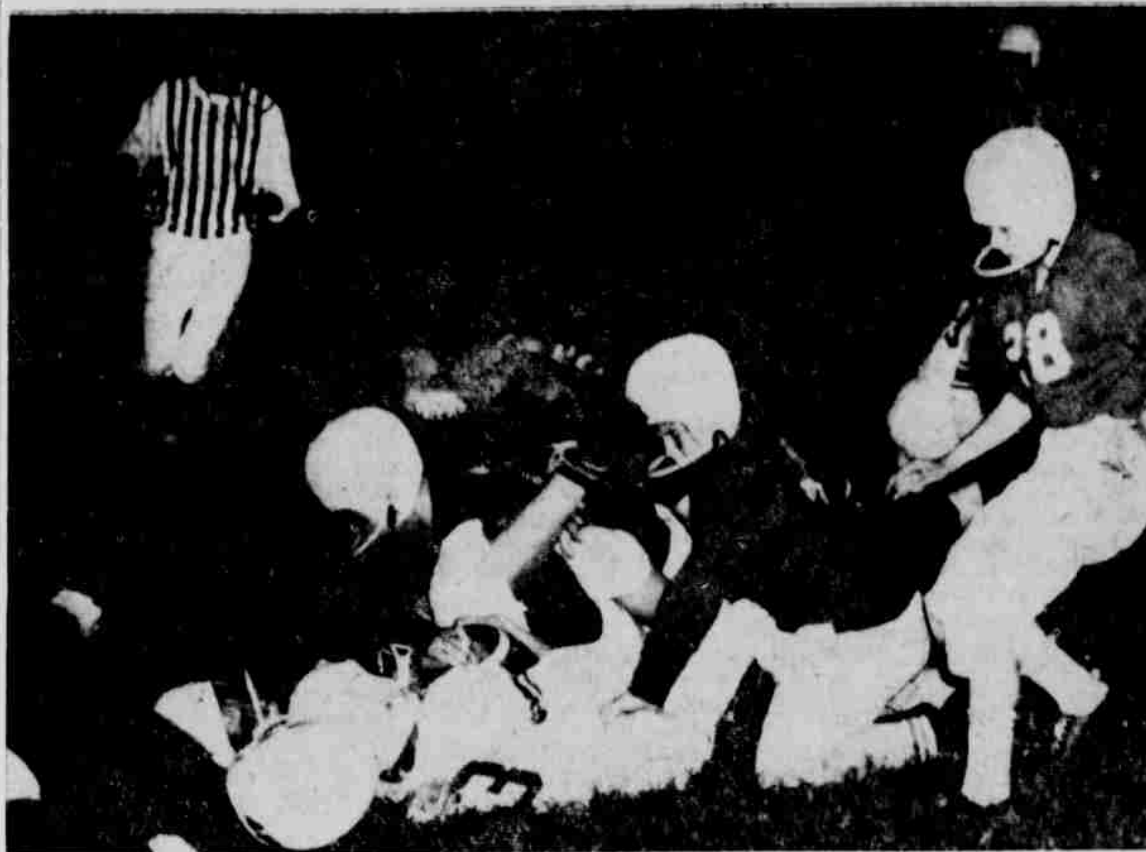
Friday night, Ryan scored first in the first quarter on a 60-yard drive completed by a 12-yard run by Russ Rocheford.

East Central, Eastern Platte Deer Area Applications Close

LINCOLN — Two new deer rifle-hunting areas closed to further application during the past week, reports the Nebraska Game Commission.

They are the East Central, filled at 750, and the Eastern Platte, closed at 500. The central unit is within four permits of filling.

An October 15 deadline was placed on all further applications for rifle hunting. Those postmarked after that cannot be accepted because of insufficient time to complete all papers necessary in issuing permits prior to the start of the season.

Deer season runs from November 5 through 9, a bucks-only season except in the Pine Ridge, where does may be shot on the last day of the season, if hunters have not filled before that time.

The pattern of filled and almost-full areas lies predominantly in the eastern part of the state. Previously filled were the Omaha and Lower Missouri units.

"This may bring a heavier percentage of whitetails into the

bag," commented Lloyd P. Vance, game division chief. "Our herds are predominately mule deer, but these occur in the central and western parts of the state."

Som 11,638 rifle applications have been received, with 14,000 authorized. Applications are available from conservation officers, county clerks, and Game Commission district offices at Lincoln, Norfolk, Bassett, North Platte, and Alliance.

Following are the number of applications for rifle permits for deer by area, with the authorized number of permits for each in parentheses:

Pine Ridge, 2,815 (3,000); Plains, 353 (750); Upper Platte, 625 (1,000); Western Sand Hills, 723 (1,000); South Platte, 610 (1,000); Southwest, 532 (750); Keya Paha, 617 (750); Central Sand Hill's 472 (750); Central, 1,246 (1,250); Central Platte, 956 (1,000); South Central, 210 (250); Upper Missouri, 730 (750); East Central, 750 (750); Eastern Platte, 500 (500); Omaha, 259 (250); and Lower Missouri, 250 (250).
