The Electoral College

Senator Barry Goldwater, recognized as the leading conservative in the Republican Party, has written a column in which he proposes to modernize the Electroal College - to enable the votes of each citizen to count equally and to prevent the votes of many citizens from being completely discounted.

The average citizen may not even realize how the Electoral College works to disenfranchise millions of Americans. As Senator Goldwater points out in his recent column, the vote in a state such as New York State can be very close-say 4,000,000 votes for one candidate and 3,-000,000 for the other, and the candidate who receives 3,000,000 popular votes wins none of the state's electoral votes.

Under this system, obviously the man who wins the most popular votes in the country is not necessarily elected. In fact, in our history we have had Presidents elected who received fewer popular votes

than their opponents.

The Electoral College was set up in the early years of our Republic to enable the people of each state to select able leaders in their state to choose a President. At that time it was highly unlikely that the citizens of each state would know the candidates for President, and anything much about them.

Therefore, it was thought to have the voters of each state select distinguished and experienced statesmen, who might know the candidates and their records first-hand, and have these men actually elect the President.

This was done, and also the Electoral College system of giving all the states' votes to one candidate was also set up. However, as it became desirable to allow the people to exercise their own judgement, the system was changed so that the people voted for electors pledged to one of the candidates.

This modernization was effected, and today another modernization, which is even more badly needed, is one which will allow every vote for President count. The solution is to divide the electoral votes of each state in democratic proportion to the percentage of the popular vote that Presidential candidate received.

Until this is done, presidential electons in the United States will not be democrate, and millions of Americans will waste their ballots.
