The principal of and interest on any bonds issued may be se-cured by a pledge of the lease and the revenues therefrom and by mort-gage upon such property. Sec. 6. No corporation shall be permitted to issue stock or bonds except for an equivalent in money paid or labor done, or property actually received and applied to the purpose for which such corpora-tion was created, and neither labor nor property shall be received in pay-

of the State of Nebraska for approval the following amendment to Article VIII, section 1, of the Constitution of Nebraska, which is hereby proposed by the Legislature: "Sec. 1. The necessary

revenue of the state and

its governmental subdi-visions shall be raised by taxation in such manner as the Legislature may direct. Taxes shall be levied valuation uniformly and proportionately upon all tangible property franchises, except that the Legislature may provide for a different method of taxing motor vehicles; Provided, that such tax proceeds from motor vehicles taxed in each coun-ty shall be allocated to the state, counties, townships cities, villages, and school districts of such county in the same proportion that the levy of each bears to the total levy of said county on personal tangi-ble property. The Legislature may prescribe standards and methods for the determination of the value of real or other tangible property at uniform and proportionate values. Taxes uniform as to class may be levied by valuation upon all other property. Taxes, other than property taxes, may be authorized by law. Existing revenue laws shall continue in effect until changed by the Leg-islature. The Legislature may provide that live-stock shall constitute a separate and distinct class of property for purposes of taxation and may further provide for reciprocal and proportionate taxation of livestock located in this state for only part of a
