NEHAWKA (Special) — Mr. K. Patrick Okura, chief probation officer of the juvenile court of Douglas County, spoke to members of the PTA Thursday evening at the school auditorium.

He told the aims of the court and stressed the need of a juvenile judge who is interested in children. Douglas and Lancaster counties are the only two eligible to elect juvenile judge and voters in those two counties will vote on this in November. Mr. Okura told of specific cases handled by the court which were very interesting.

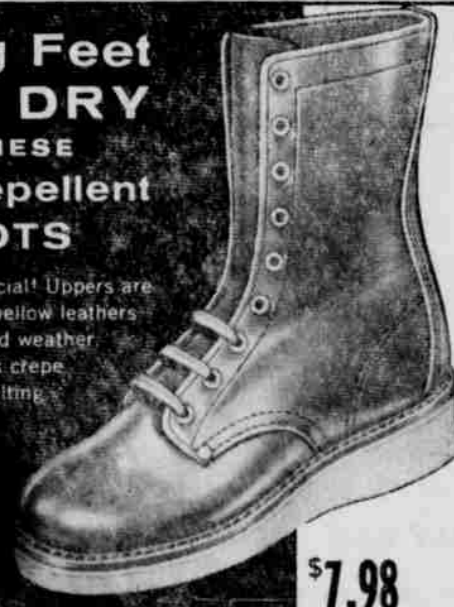
