

Fairbury One of Toughest Grid Foes Here Friday

Plattsmouth High, still looking for its first win during a tough season, faces one of its toughest games of the year here Friday when Fairbury High comes in at 7:30.

Plattsmouth has dropped seven straight. Fairbury is 5-2 and co-champion along with Lincoln Northeast of its "other" conference, owning victories over Lincoln Southeast and Beatrice.

In the Twin Rivers Conference, Fairbury is 2-1, having defeated Crete and Beatrice by identical scores of 33-0, and lost to Nebraska City, 12-0.

Plattsmouth is 0-4 in the Twin Rivers.

So, Coach Bill Hawkins and squad have their chore mapped for Friday night — it's a hard one!

Fairbury has a lot of speed, good size in the middle of the line and a great runner in John Nespor.

Plattsmouth is in comparatively good shape for this one.

Only Tackle John Carr is "doubtful" after suffering a badly split lip on the first play last week at Nebraska City when the Blue Devils lost, 45-0. Several Plattsmouth players

were slowed by injuries the last several games.

Against other teams Fairbury also played, Plattsmouth bowed to Crete, 14-7; and to Beatrice, 25-21.

Hawkins says he plans to use 10 players on both offense and defense Friday night with Joe Van Ness playing defense in place of Emery Green.




