



APPROVED METHOD



No. 7—For Children

For applying Rescue Breathing efforts to a child, make relatively shallow breaths appropriate for the child's size, at the rate of about 20 per minute (as against 12 per minute for

If air passages still appear to be blocked, the child should be suspended momentarily by the ankles, or inverted over one arm and given two or three sharps pats between shoulder blades. Then repeat blowing process.

MOUTH AND NOSE

For infant or small child, place your mouth over both mouth and nose, and breathe into the child. For adult close nose with fingers and breathe through his mouth only.
