ORDINANCE NO. 999

AN ORDINANCE REGULAT-ING PARKING OF MOTOR VE-HICLES ON THE PUBLIC STREETS AND ALLEYS OF THE CITY OF PLATTSMOUTH, NE-BRASKA, PROVIDING FOR RE-MOVAL OF VEHICLES ILLE-GALLY PARKED, AND PRO-VIDING FOR CLEARING OF STREETS OF ALL VEHICLES FOR THE PURPOSE OF STREET CLEANING OR SNOW REMOVAL, PROHIBITING PARKING ON SUCH STREETS AT CERTAIN TIMES, REPEAL ING SECTIONS 4 AND 8 OF ORDINANCE 808, PROVIDING PENALTY FOR VIOLATION AND FIXING AN EFFECTIVE

Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of

Plattsmouth, Nebraska: Section 1, For purposes of this Ordinance the term vehicle shall include any self-propelled mechanical device used for the carriage or transportation of persons, equipment, or live-stock or merchandise of any nature whatsoever, any trailer, wagon, any item of equipment designed to be towed or propelled by any other vehicle or any other form of power, and any other equipment mounted on Iracks, skids, wheels or rollers. Section 2. No vehicle shall be parked or permitted to remain on the streets or alleys in the City of Plattsmouth, Nebraska, in such a position as to obstruct or partially obstruct, the movement of traffic or free passage on any such street or alley, or in such a position as to obstruct any alley, crosswalk, sidewalk, or private driveway and no truck shall be parked for the purpose of loading or unloading in such a manner that any part thereof extends beyond the center line of any street or the paved portion Section 3. No vehicle shall be

permitted to remain or be parked on any street or alley in the City of Plattsmouth, Nebraska, for a period of more than 48 consecutive hours without being moved at least once, whether or not such vehicle is capable of moving under its own power, and any vehicle parked in vio-lation of this provision shall be removed and stored at the expense of the owner thereof upon the order of the Street Commissioner or any member of the Police Department of said City, and it shall be no excuse for any wiolation of this provision that such vehicle is surrounded by snow or otherwise incapable of being moved. - Section 4. On any street, or

any portion of any street, when in the opinion of the Street Commissioner or any member of the Police Department of the City of Plattsmouth, such street should be cleared of vehicles for street cleaning or snow removal. appropriate signs bearing the langauge. "No Parking in this Street Cleaning" shall be posted at each end of each block proposed to be cleaned, and after such signs have been in place for four hours, it shall be the duty of the Police Departthe Street Commissioner to cause any vehicles re-maining in said block or parked giving weekend with home folks. therein after four hours after the Edmund Steiner family. such notice has been given to be removed and stored at the expense of the owner thereof, by tow truck or other means, and "no vehicle shall be parked or be permitted to remain on said street until such signs are re-
