The Growing States

The latest Washington estimate on growth for the current decade - the sixties - shows that the western states and Alaska, and a few other states, will experience rapid growth in the next ten

The fastest growing state in the United States is expected to be Florida, which now has a population of 4,930,000, and which is expected to have a population of 7,631,000 by 1970. This is a gain of 54.8 percent.

Alaska is expected to grow at a rate of better than 50 percent, and Arizona is expected to grow at a rate of approximately 47 percent. These states are exwill grow rapidly.

Carifornia is expected to grow by 37 percent, Hawaii by 36 percent, Nevadaby 35 percent, New Mexico by 34 percent, Colorado by 25 percent. Connecticut by land by 26 percent, New Jersey by 24 percent and Utah by 25 percent.

Other states which are expected to grew faster than average are Idaho, Indiand, Louisiana, Ohio. Oregon, Texas, Virginia and Washington.

Only two states are expected to lose population - Arkansas and North Da-

States which are expected to grow very much slower than the national averag include: Alabama, lowa, Kentucky, Mississippi, Missouri, Nebraska, New York, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Vermont, and West Virginia. * * *
