





The Plains unit herd was reduced by 246 deer to 454 hunters, a 54-1 percentage. The Up-per Platte, Upper Missouri, Southern Platte, and Southwest units were "on the button. What pulled the total figure as down were the relatively lower figures from eastern and southeastern Nebraska-white-tailed deer range.

"And whitetails are just smarter than mule doer, Steen pointed out. "They're warier, and they have the added advantage of more brushy country where they can hide much to easier."


A 27.2 per cent score was realized in the Lower Missouri unit where 68 bucks fell to 250 kg permittees, and 24.3 score in the Eastern Platte unit where 121 of 497 hunters hit.

Results in the Pine Ridge were slightly lower than expected. This was a bucks-only area Bg for four days of the season, with either sex allowed on the final day, A total of 1,478 deer were baken by 2,988 permittees, a 40.4 percentage.

"Under this type of season, to to 50 per cent of the kill in normaliy expected on the last day when does are legal game," Steen explained. "But this year only 38 per cent of the harvest was taken the final day, indicuting that many hunters did not take advantage of the doc harvest.
