

# Devils Go To Bishop Ryan Searching for Regeneration

Plattsmouth High's beleaguered cage Blue Devils will be looking for a resurgence of their scoring when they meet Bishop Ryan High in Omaha Friday night.

There, they'll be facing an up-and-coming athletic school's team which Tuesday night defeated Nebraska City, 70-66, behind the 22-point guidance of Chuck Shimerda.



That the Devils' point-making needs more regeneration was evidenced here Tuesday night when they scored only 12 points in the second half in bowing for the third straight time, 40-31 to Glenwood, Iowa.

As in its first two games, Plattsmouth started fairly well only to be left behind.

It was 15-12 for Glenwood after the first quarter. Dave Albert got five and Duane Haith four for the Devils and Keith Asmussen seven for Glenwood.

At the half, the score favored Glenwood, 24-19, after the Devils had missed several chances to narrow the margin just before intermission.

Tom Smith's four out of five free throws produced half of Plattsmouth's second-quarter total.

The third quarter went to Glenwood, 11-6, as the play grew more ragged. Six players shared Plattsmouth's scoring that quarter and Asmussen got the other seven of his game's leading 14.

The fourth quarter produced a lot of movement but little scoring, Glenwood winning it 5-4 as reserves played for both sides near the end.

It was a disappointing night all-around for the Devils. They managed only 11 goals and just 9 of 23 free throws.

Albert led the Devils with 10 points.

Glenwood was even less fortunate at the free-throw line, converting but 14 out of 37 chances.

The game saw 43 fouls toted, even two on the same play by two Glenwood players who hacked Dave Albert.

Another unusual happening was cancellation of a free throw attempt by Glenwood because the player got too free with bouncing the ball as he made ready for the toss.

After Friday, Plattsmouth will have one more game before the holidays, Dec. 23 here against Blair, then will be idle until Pawnee City comes in Jan. 6.

St. John's volleyball team ran its winning streak to four games as it squeaked past St. Mary's.

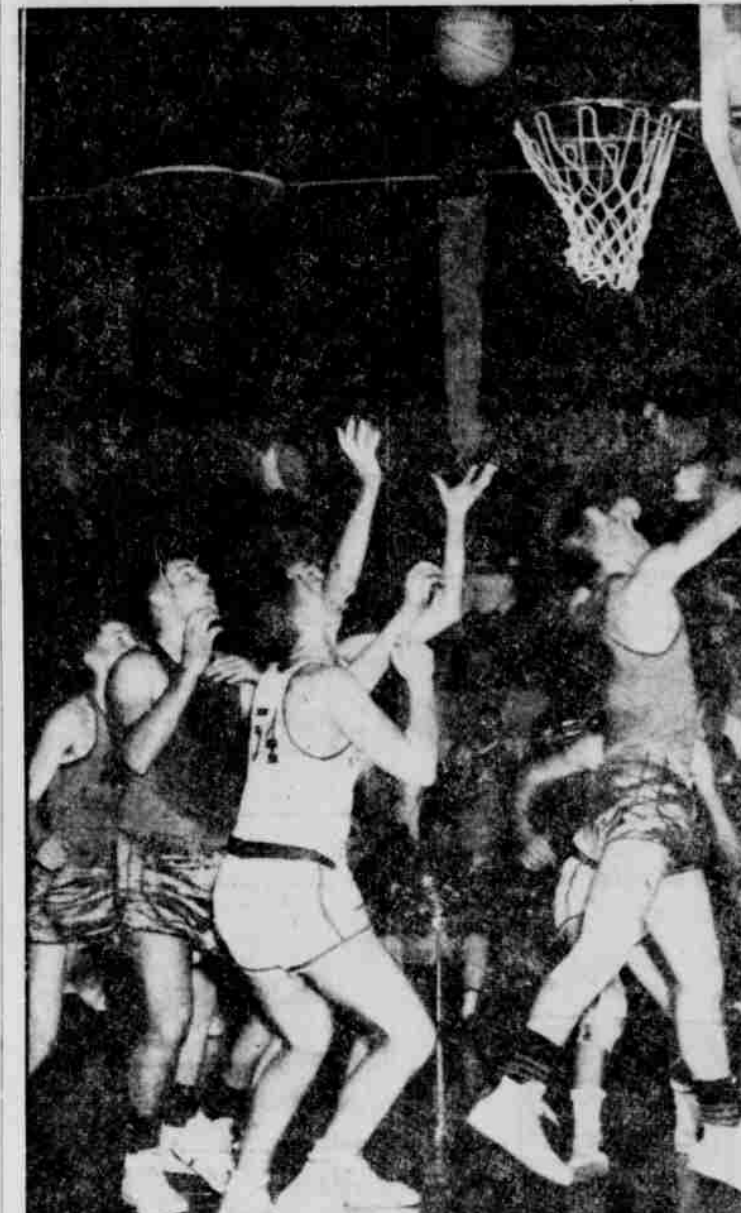

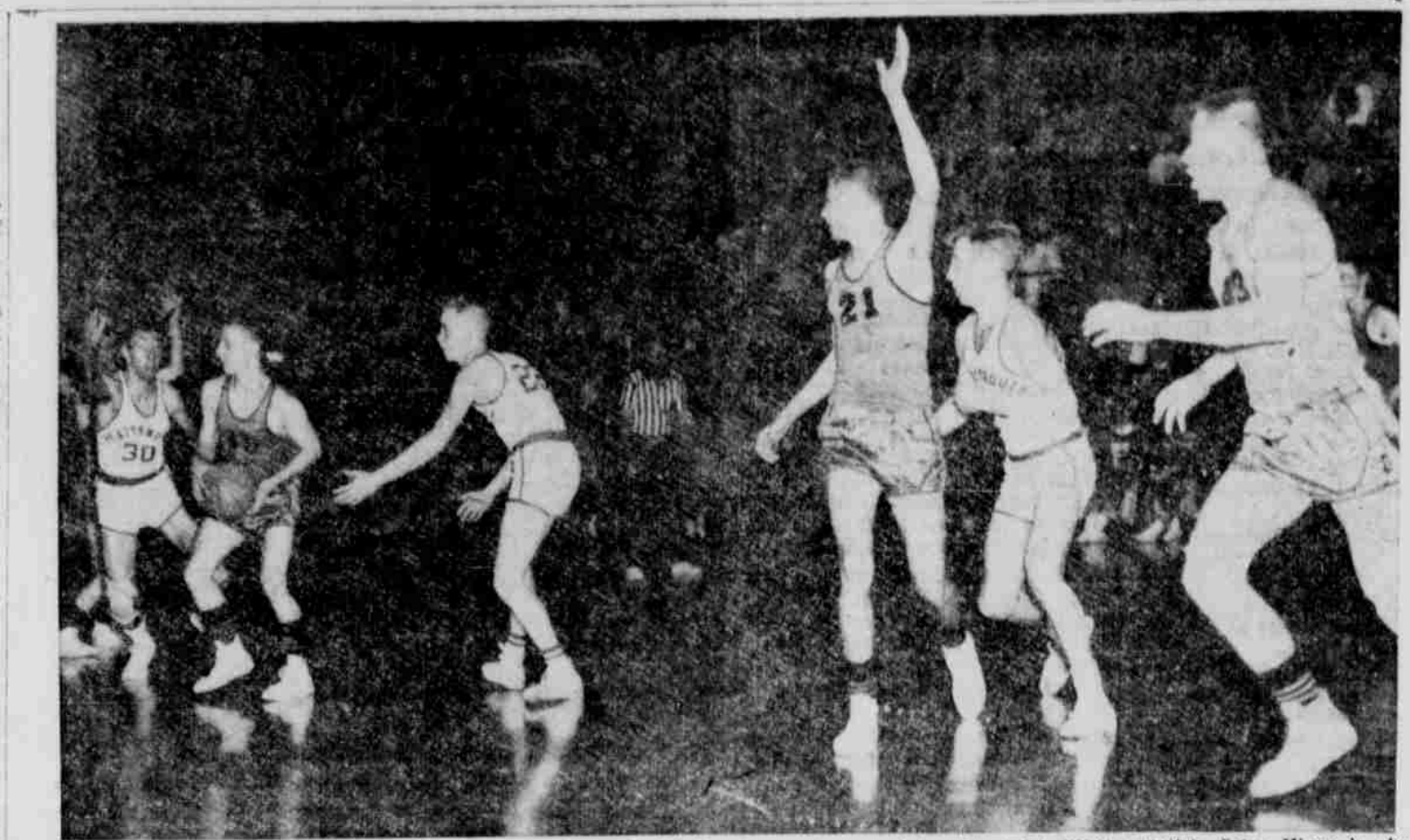

## Legion Sponsors Oratorical Contest For High Schools

Kenneth Yost, State Commander of the American Legion, announced today that the American Legion, Department of Nebraska, cooperating with the High Schools, will sponsor the twenty-third annual High School Oratorical Contest.

Plattsmouth and other high schools in Cass County are expected to have participants. The Contest is an Americanism activity of the Legion and is approved by the National Association of Secondary-School Principals.

Information regarding the contest is now in the hands of the schools, giving them ample time to prepare for the contests. The District Contests will be held in Nebraska during the latter part of February, with the State Contest to be held in Elgin, Nebraska, on March 6. The National Contest will be held in East Hartford, Connecticut, on April 20.

Prizes to the contestants range from Medals and Savings Bonds on the District level, to a \$4,000 Scholarship for the National winner. Charles E. Chace, State Chairman of the Legions Oratorical and Education Committee, is urging all schools in Nebraska to participate, stating, "The program serves a two fold purpose. Besides giving students a lesson in speaking ability, it also improves their knowledge of the Constitution as all orations of the contest must be on the subject, 'The Constitution of the United States'."

## Sand Hills Again Best Deer Area

LINCOLN — For the second straight year Nebraska's most productive rifle hunting for deer occurred in the unique Sand Hills, where 62.4 per cent of 1960's hunters bagged bucks.

Game Commission figures released today showed that 531 of 851 permittees in the western Sand Hills unit came out with bucks. The Keya Paha unit finished second with 54.5, with 399 of 732 hunters scoring. Third was the Central Sand Hills unit which produced 275 deer for 537 hunters, a 51.3 mark.

"Even with this good kill, the harvest was still conservative," stated Director M. O. Steen. "The removal of these bucks will in no way interfere with the reproduction potential of the deer herds in these units."

"A bucks-only season in no instance has reduced the increase of the herd in the next year."

In contrast to the success in Sand Hills and Keya Paha units, the kill in the Omaha unit was somewhat "disappointing."

Deer numbers had built up on the area until the animals had become a hazard on the runways of the Omaha Airport. To alleviate the situation, the Game Commission authorized the taking of deer of either sex any day of the season. All 250 permits were issued, but only 72 animals were killed, for a success score of 28.8. The relatively low harvest probably was due to hunters' having limited access to the area.

Last summer, when setting up the seasons, game technicians had aimed for a 40 per cent kill score in the bucks-only units.

"We missed that by 1.2 per cent," Steen said. "The actual kill in all-bucks units was 41.2 per cent."

The Plains unit herd was reduced by 246 deer to 434 hunters, a 54-1 percentage. The Upper Platte, Upper Missouri, Southern Platte, and Southwest units were "on the button." What pulled the total figure down were the relatively lower figures from eastern and south-eastern Nebraska—white-tailed deer range.

"And whitetails are just smarter than mule deer," Steen pointed out. "They're wavier, and they have the added advantage of more brushy country where they can hide much easier."

A 27.2 per cent score was realized in the Lower Missouri unit where 68 bucks fell to 250 permittees, and 24.3 score in the Eastern Platte unit where 121 of 497 hunters hit.

Results in the Pine Ridge were slightly lower than expected. This was a bucks-only area for four days of the season, with either sex allowed on the final day. A total of 1,478 deer were taken by 2,988 permittees, a 49.4 percentage.

"Under this type of season, 45 to 50 per cent of the kill is normally expected on the last day when deer are legal game," Steen explained. "But this year only 38 per cent of the harvest was taken the final day, indicating that many hunters did not take advantage of the doe harvest."

Landowners in the Pine Ridge were agreeable to a slow increase in deer numbers, so hunting was limited to bucks for most of the season.

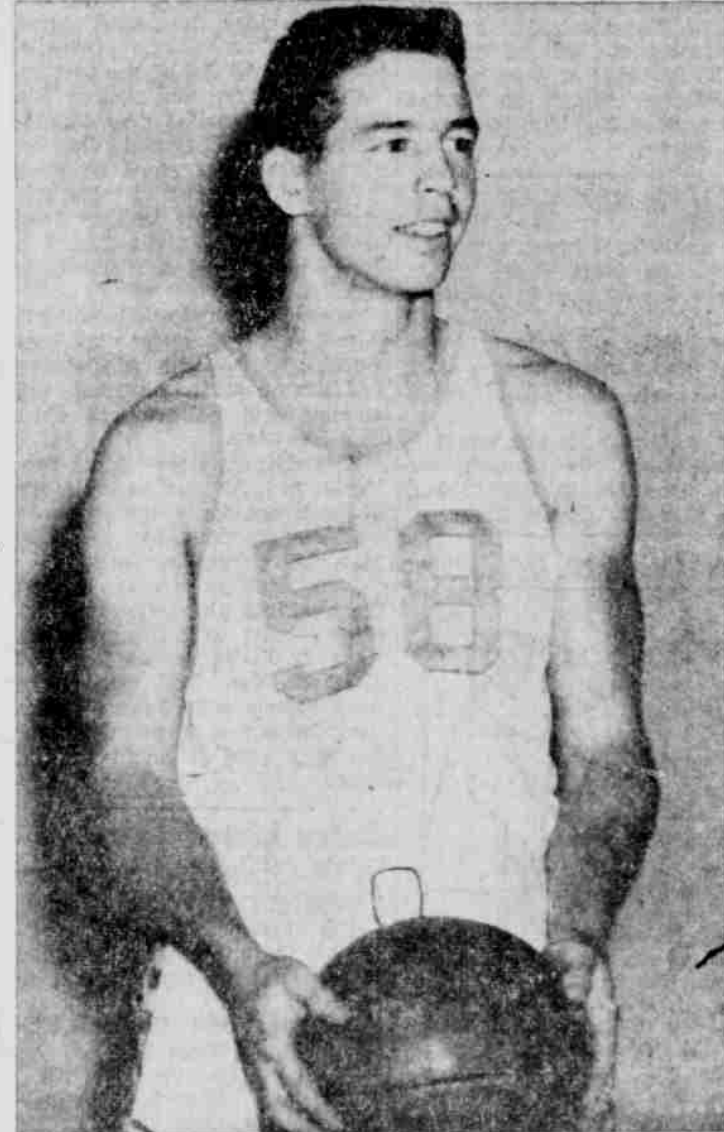
Mr. Eidenmiller has to remain in bed for two weeks. He broke a leg two weeks ago the past Saturday.
