A farmer in Arkansas, Buck Nelson, is writing a book about his trip to Mars. Venus and the Moon. Buck says space ships began hovering over his farm back in 1954.

On April 24, 1955, he says, a space ship landed on his farm and took him aboard for three days he traveled about with the space people. He visited the three mentioned and talked to the space people and saw them living on the planet-he Says.


