parking on the west side. On North 7th Street from Avenue D to Avenue E - one side parking on the west side.

On North 5th Street - from Avenue C to Avenue D, one side parking on the east side; from Avenue D to Avenue E, one side parking on the west side. On Valley Street - parking restricted on the curve near the foot of Valley.

The measures were taken on recommendation of the police chief or city councilmen.
