SPRAY ELMS THIS SPRING

Due to the evident early Spring, and the early budding of the trees, we propose to start spraying as weather permits. It is recommended that the trees be sprayed twice: Once before leafing with a 12% DDT with white oil added and again soon after the tree has its leaves. This time with a 6% DDT and white oil solution.
