"The local Board is not opposed to the state providing such funds since this would be a demonstration of the State's responsibility to public school education in Nebraska. However, since the people of Plattsmouth and other towns in Nebraska are equally hard pressed by the states inadequate system of school finances, it was the position of the Plattsmouth School Board that any such aid should he spread to all such schools." Mussman said.

There was some mention of the formation of a Metropolitan School District. Since this was a new approach no position was taken by the Board until such time that more information could be obtained and studied. Gov. Morrison has set a meeting for further discussion of the tax problems of schools in the Omaha area for next Wednesday afternoon, Representatives of the Plattsmouth City Schools have been asked to attend.

Next year our total mill levy for school purposes will be above 60 mills.

This does not reflect an extravagance on the part of the city schools for it is possible to demonstrate that our per pupil costs are extremely low. There are a good many indications that the quality of our educational program is suffering as a result of the efforts to economize.

This, then should be the point of chief concern. That further restrictions of budget items will result in sacrifice of the educational program offered by the City Schools.

This, too, should be the approach used by interested patrons to besiege our representative in the state legislature, Edwin McHugh and the governor, for state aid.
