#### City Council Meeting July 10, 1961

City Council met in regular session at 8:00 o'clock p.m. with the following present: Mayor Grant Roberts, Councilmen L. W. Moore, A. W. Huebner, Wm. G. Highfield, C. W. Rhylander, City Clerk Albert Olson. Absent: none.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Motion carried that plans as presented by the members of the Park Board for a wading pool for Garfield Park, construction to be financed by the Junior Chamber of Commerce at a cost of \$1,087.00 and supervision and maintenance to be under the direction and supervision of the Park Board, be approved.

Mayor Roberts commended Chas. Wurga, Pres. of the Jr. Chamber of Commerce for the installation of the new street signs.

Motion carried to advertise for bids for 1000 feet of 2 1/2 inch hose and 500 feet of 1 1/2 inch hose for the Fire Dept., bids to be received and opened on July 31, 1961. Also approved the request of the Fire Chief to purchase 6 pr. boots, 6 helmets, 6 coats and a clamp for the fire department.

Motion carried that petition signed by John Chudy and 4 others objecting to the proposed St. Improvement Dist. No. 153 for paving running east and west on 3rd Ave., be referred to the City Attorney for checking of records.

Motion carried that the petitions signed by Mrs. Luetta Stokes and 8 others, Marion Taylor, and the Chicago Burlington Railroad Co. objecting to the proposed creation of St. Imp. Dist. No. 155 be referred to the City Attorney for checking of the records.

A resolution was adopted to precede with the improvements in Dist. No. 152 in accordance with Ord. No. 1008 as no objections were filed by the property owners to the proposed district.

A resolution was adopted that Henningson, Durham & Richardson, Inc. Special Engineers be employed in charge of designing, preparing of plans and specifications and supervising construction of street improvements in St. Imp. Dist. No. 154 in accordance with engineering agreement dated Aug. 25th, 1958.

Motion carried that Parking Meter collections for the weeks ending June 20, 27 & July 3, 1961 reported as \$217.00, \$214.00 & \$202.00 respectively be accepted.

Motion carried to move the street light on Ave. C between 12th and 13th St. up to 13th St.

Motion carried to purchase 2 dump boxes for \$920.00 each from Rubin Auto Co.

Motion carried to engage Carl Morehead to clean out ditch and lay line on A St. & 6th Ave. at \$13.00 per hr. with \$200.00 minimum.

Motion carried that City Attorney be authorized to hire Co. Surveyor to run lines on so called 7th St. between 5th & 6th Ave.

**Special Meeting, City Council July 14, 1961**

Special meeting of the Mayor, City Council and City Clerk was held pursuant to the call of the Mayor and the published Notice to Bidders calling for bids on the furnishing of labor, tools, material and equipment in connection with the construction of sanitary sewers in S.S. Dist. 20 and for the purpose of receiving and opening same for the construction of street improvements in St. Imp. Dist. Nos. 151 and 152, to consider an ordinance creating a street improvement district for Patricia Heights Addition and Patterson Ave.

The following were present: Mayor Grant Roberts, Councilmen A. W. Huebner, Wm. G. Highfield, C. W. Rhylander, City Clerk Albert Olson. Absent: Councilman L. W. Moore.

The following bids for the proposed sanitary sewer improvements were received:

The Mayor stated the next order of business was to open and tabulate bids, award a contract and approve the contract and bond for the furnishing of labor, tools and equipment and materials in connection with the construction of street improvements in St. Imp. SOUTH ASHLAND (Special)—Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Wagner and Mr. and Mrs. Ivan Armstrong accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Ray Everman of Wann attended the twentieth annual picnic of the former residents of the Nebraska Ordinance Plant, Sunday at Wild Court Park near Fremont.

There were 65 present. A basket dinner was held at noon, with a business meeting later.

Edward Deerson of near Yutan served as president, Mrs. Fred Ratslaff of near Havelock as secretary. They were elected to serve another year.

The picnic is held the fourth Sunday in July at Wild Court.

It will be 21 years in October, that the news came the government was taking over that area to make a bomb loading plant.

The area included more than 17,500 acres and caused 200 families to hunt new homes, that late in the season.

At that time of year, farms for rent were already rented. Farms for sale had also been rented and many of those buying could not get possession.

The families affected by the taking of their homes had to move. Some yet that autumn and many during the winter.

By early spring, workers were swarming all over the area, especially where the load lines are now located.

It was a sad time for all residents. Older people were forced to leave. They had spent almost their entire lives there.
