"I hope we can win that first one (against Crete here Sept. 15). That would be a big morale booster for the squad and a big boost for fans interested in football," Hale said.

He said he is concerned about an apparent lack of interest generally among the boys of the school in football, and is working at finding out just why more boys aren't out for the team. He's constantly working to recruit players, he said.

A new addition to the local football program, intramural football for junior high boys, has been added and will have an effect on football here in latter years, Hale said.

The aim is for as many as four teams to play a round-robin schedule so that any boy interested in playing will have a

Hale said that while he wants to win games this year certainly, the junior high program is vital.

phrey and Cecil McKnight). He said he's heard inquiries against such a club. If anyone game with Humboldt, Sept. 8. comes to me with a suggestion.






