Training Meeting At Price Home

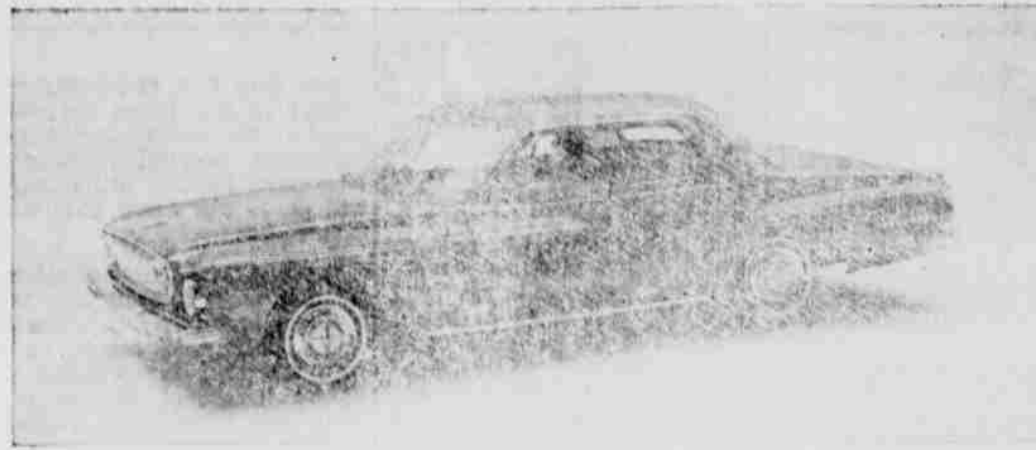
MURRAY (Special) — The Southeast Training Meeting for Extension Clubs was held Sept. 15 at the Dennison Price home.

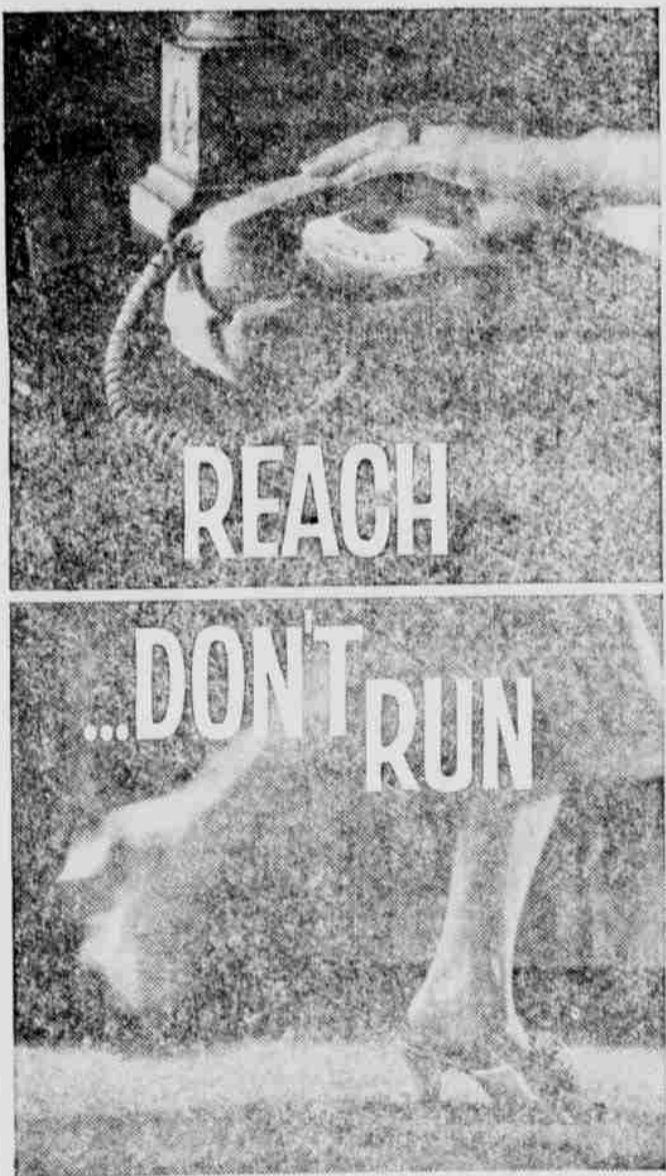
