



the job in Scottsbluff A COMPLETE COMMUNITY INVENTORY

Consumers Public Power District's steam generating plant is pictured against a backdrop of the Scottsbluff National Monument. Consumers has just let a contract for the installation of a 22,500 kilowatt turbine generator, the third generating unit to be installed at the Scottsbluff plant since 1946, to serve the ever in creasing demand of this and other thriving communities in western Nebraska.

As the first step in a comprehensive community development program, the citizens of Scottsbluff have just completed a complete survey of the city's resources.

Among the groups participating in the inventory was the Community Development Department of Consumers Public Power District. The Department has a three-fold objective: to improve the economic position of existing businesses; to assist in establishing new
