Movie films were shown of grain elevator fires by Bill Behrens, State Fire Instructor. In the film the fires had been set to destroy the buildings but were controlled so that all debris would fall into the center of the fires.

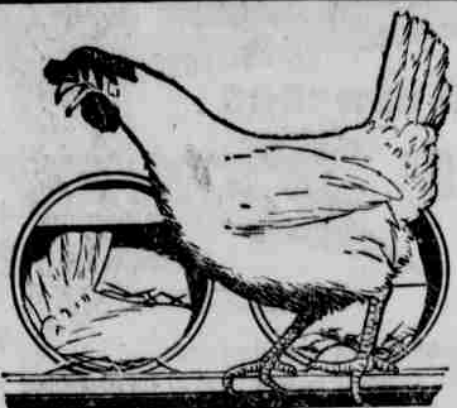
