- 1. 1961 Registration Certificate
- 2. 1962 Motor Vehicle Tax Statement
- 3. 25c Postage

4. Remittance to cover tax. postage and license fee. Be certain to enclose all necessary papers. Failure to do so will cause unnecessary delay. Please do not send tax on vehicles you are not licensing at this time.

Non-Resident Military Personnel must present:

- 1. 1961 Registration Certificate
- 2. 1962 Non-Resident Certificate signed by authorized Officer

Commercial Trucks and Trailers, Empty Weight Certificates are required unless license is a renewal.

All House Trailers not assessed as Real Estate must have a \$2 Permit Plate if trailer has been in Nebraska more than 30 days. Owner must present proof of ownership and pay 1962 tax, plus any delinquent tax on trailer.

The Treasurer's Office will be open 8:00 to 4:00 Monday through Friday in January and February.

Persons driving vehicles with 1961 license plates after midnight, Feb. 28, 1962, will be subject to enforcement of licensing laws.
