Sun Collectors

For many years, researchers have concerned themselves with collecting the energy and heat of the sun and putting it to useful work for mankind. The United States Department of Agriculture has recently sponsored the testing of two solar heat collectors in the State of Kansas for the purpose of drying stored grain.

If these tests prove successful and harness some of the heat from the sun to maintain the grain, it is altogether possible that this use can be extended. Especially on the farm the project presents new horizons — not only for grains and animals, but also for the heating of farm homes.

The new sun collectors absorb the heat and maintain it. When the user desires more heat, he circulates air into the collectors and when the air returns it has been heated by passing through the collectors.

If this process can be worked with reasonably inexpensive collectors that can maintain heat for periods of time without direct sunlight, it would seem a landmark development in science.

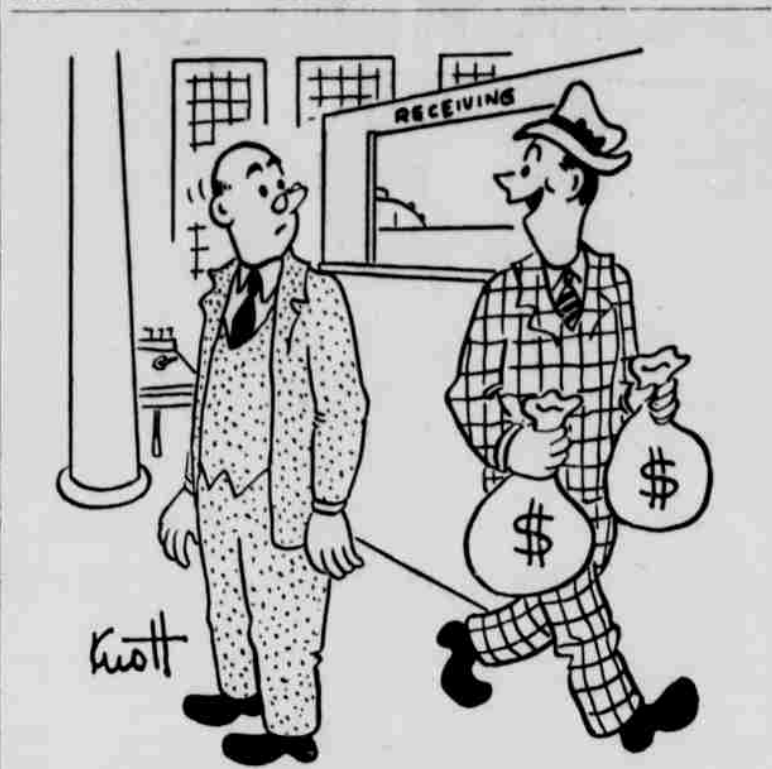
These tests have received very little publicity but could, within the next five or ten years, change the present outlook on heat and energy. Many people would be benefitted by this process, especially the farmer.

Down Memory Lane

40 YEARS AGO

"NOT MUCH DIFFERENCE" said a headline in the Jan. 19, 1922, Journal, with the following: "W. F. Gillespie, sorting over some old papers a few days ago came across a card of one of the leading grain houses of St. Louis and which had been printed in 1906 and giving the prices of corn, wheat was quoted at 42 cents, mixed corn 44 3/4 cents and straight corn

at 46 cents. The present prices which are cut in half from the war time figures, seem to be better than this list of 16 years ago and if other commodities and articles used in the daily life had scaled down to the level of the farm products the farmers would feel better about it."—Insurance of crops as a method of stabilizing prices of farm products was expected to be one of suggestions put forward at the national agricultural conference for inclusion in a permanent national farm policy. Discussion within the conference would be expected to develop whether proponents would recommend that the insurance be carried by the farmers co-operatively, by private companies, or through government aid.—The lecture of Father Czerny of Wilber at "The Parable was a valuable compilation of personal experiences interwoven with religious reflections. The illustrating pictures, it is true, did not reach the perfection of our American slides—but it must be taken into consideration that Father Czerny came almost a year ago from that part of the old world where under the prevailing conditions, the things which appear to our pampered taste poor and simple are considered as being something worthy of a appreciation."—The U.S. Chamber of Commerce boosted Smile Week and "The local Chamber of Commerce is to take the matter up and President John P. Sattler and Secretary Morgan who are smilers themselves will join in pushing the movement along that in this week at least the inhabitants of the city can appear with one of those real happy smiles."—"Last Sunday there was a great deal of excitement created in the Scioto bottoms southeast of Union when George Everett and his son Leslie became engaged in an argument with a party of hunters from Omaha who were engaged in hunting on the Everett farm, and as a result of the argument, Leslie Everett received one fractured rib and was badly bruised up by being struck by one of the men and Mr. Everett knocked down but not seriously hurt.—Union Schools had enrollment of 137, 48 of those pupils non-residents. There were 42 students in Union High School.

By Rep. Glenn Cunningham Washington, D.C. (Special)—A new Speaker of the House of Representatives is now at the helm — John W. McCormack of Massachusetts, a 70-year-old veteran of House legislative battles for the past 33 years. McCormack is known as a vigorous partisan fighter, as he had to be in his post of majority floor leader. I believe he will carry on in the best traditions of the Speakership, however, and be fair and just in his rulings as Speaker. Partisanship aside, he is well known as a man who keeps his word.
