Deadline for purchase and display of 1962 vehicular plates was Feb. 25.

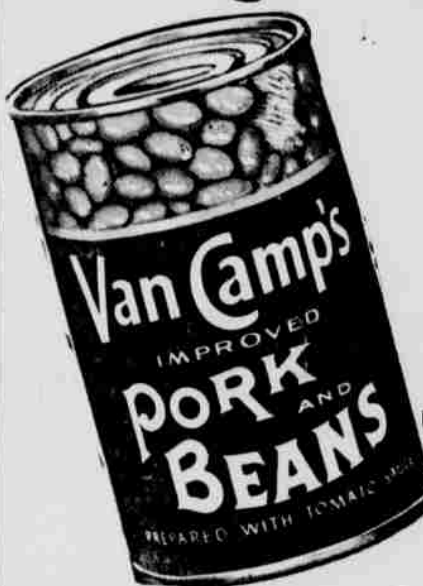
The deputies were also to begin a check of trailer homes for compliance with state laws, according to Sheriff Tom Solomon.
