Year-End Nears For 1961 Wool Payment Program

The 1961 Wool Program incentive payments, to be made this summer, will cover only wool and unborn lambs which are marketed before March 31, 1962. Ivan G. Althouse, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, reminded growers today.

That is the closing date for the 1961 program, which extends from April 1, 1961 to March 31, 1962.

Growers will have 30 days after the closing date in which to file their applications for the payments.

Payments to producers for the 1961 marketing year will follow the same methods used in previous years. Short wool payments will be equal to a percentage of each producer's cash returns from wool sales. The percentage—to be announced later—will be that required to raise the national average price received by all producers for short wool during the marketing year up to the incentive price of 62 cents per pound.

Lamb payments will be made to each producer who sells lambs that have never been shorn. The payments will be at a rate per hundredweight of live animals marketed to compensate for the wool on them on a basis comparable to the national average incentive payment per pound of shorn wool.

The chairman emphasized the importance of keeping adequate records on sales, which must support the information on payment applications. Thus, producers' sales records for shorn wool would show name and address of buyer, date of sale, name and address of producer, net weight of wool sold, and net proceeds after normal marketing deductions.

Under the 1962 wool program growers in Cass County last year received a total of \$6,917.42 in incentive payments earned during the marketing year ended March 31, 1961.

EAGLE (Special)—Eliza Marie Stoll was born Feb. 22, 1868, near Lockport, N. J., daughter of Joe and Mary Stoll. She and her parents came to Nebraska when she was seven. She was baptized in the Lutheran Church at 17 in 1885 and confirmed by the church pastor, Rev. Spriegel. The church was northeast of Oac.

Dec. 18, 1893, she was married to William Weyers. They lived on several different farms near Oac before moving to their farm southeast of Eagle 53 years ago.

Driver's Licenses And Points

(One of a series "You and The Law" Prepared by the Nebraska State Bar Association).

Driver's Licenses and Points. In 1953 the point system for the revocation of driver's licenses was established. This law was designed to prevent and eliminate successive traffic violations. Under it about 100 drivers lose their license each month.

The number of points which may be assessed for one offense ranges from one to twelve. Twelve-point violations involve serious violations of law.

These include conviction of a felony in the commission of which a motor vehicle was used, third offense drunken driving, third offense reckless or willful reckless driving, and failing to stop and render aid when in-

volved in an accident in which a person is killed or injured. In an accident involving only property damage, eight points are lost if the driver fails to stop and render aid, but only four if reports the accident to the police within twelve hours of the accident.

Six-point violations include drunken driving or driving while under the influence of a drug, and willful reckless driving. Reckless driving costs five points. All these offenses involve more than just an accidental violation of the law.

Careless driving is a four-point offense while negligent driving in violation of a city or village ordinance is a three-point violation. The points assessed for speeding vary from not more than five miles per hour over the speed limit-one point.

More than five but not more than ten-two points. More than

ten miles per hour over the speed limit-three points. Other traffic violations—except parking violations, muffler violations and overloading of trucks—cost two points.

Any driver's license will be revoked when twelve points are accumulated in a two-year period. A probationary licensee also loses his license if he gets eight points in one year period. Since it takes a number of points or conviction of a serious violation of law to lose one's license, the average driver will not be bothered by this law. The law is designed to keep the persistent violator in line or off the road for the protection of the public.
