Unicameral Committees Busy; Teacher Licensing Advocated

LINCOLN — Committees of state senators are heading into the busiest time as they intensify work on state problems.

Reports by the dozen committees of the Legislative Council will be discussed at a meeting the latter part of November, probably around the 20th.

After this meeting of the full council, which is composed of all state senators who sit as research and study groups between sessions of the Legislature, recommendations will be made to the 1963 Unicameral.

It is expected that public hearings by the committees will be completed July 1.

Between July 1 and the November gathering, committee reports will be drafted for consideration.

Teacher Licensing
The State Board of Education says it favors a proposal by the State Council on Teacher Education which would put the power to regulate and license Nebraska teachers in the board's hands. Such authority now is vested in the Legislature.

However, the State Board of Education did not take a firm stand urging that it be specifically given the licensing authority, and declined to entirely accept the Council's recommendations on certificate regulation changes.

Under the proposal by the Council, the board would have the power to issue, renew and revoke licenses, and place limitations on the areas in which a teacher could instruct.

Personnel Sketches
There have been some changes in personnel in the Capitol, but one familiar person remains.

Mel Steen, director of the State Game Commission, has another six-year pact with the state at a higher salary. He will get \$13,620 per year, second only to the governor's \$14,000 in the Capitol. Steen previously had been paid \$10,200.

Leroy Bahensky of Palmer resigned as member of the commission to run for the Legislature.

Lee Risine, assistant director of the State Resources Division, resigned to accept a position in Texas.

The secretary of the Advisory State Highway Commission, Ed Finisar, has been named director of the Federal Crop Insurance program.

Interstate Highway
A problem that has developed on the nation-wide Interstate Highway system has been reported by Robert Meyer, traffic engineer for the State Highway Department.

Meyer said that speed limits on the Interstate in the various states range from 50 to 75 miles per hour. Nebraska's is 75 miles per hour while Iowa has a limit of 70.

The traffic expert said national highway officials are studying the problem which he feels can be corrected by legislation in the various states without Congressional action.

A committee of the highway officials has recommended Legislature give their highway departments authority to set speed limits as necessary.

State Song
One of the jobs of the 1963 Legislature may be the selection of a state song for Nebraska.

The Nebraska Song competition law is underway, with the deadline set for April 1, 1963.

Emanuel Wisnow, professor of music at the University of Nebraska, said the State Song Committee will make a final selection which will be submitted to the 1963 Unicameral.

Professional or amateur songwriters may enter the contest.

The 1961 Legislature authorized a competition in order that the state may have a state song just as it now has a state bird, flower and tree.

Because of the emotion involved in such a selection, final action could be less than tranquil in the Legislature.

Access Roads

Gov. Frank Morrison says he is "very disturbed" that Nebraska got short-changed in the amount of land Army engineers acquired around Lewis and Clarke Lake as compared with the land received by South Dakota.

The result permitted the federal government to build highways to recreation areas on the South Dakota side, but made construction difficult on the Nebraska side because of the limited amount of land, the chief executive said.

He said a bill passed in the last Legislature was a last ditch maneuver and obviously not the solution to the access road situation in recreational areas.

The governor said it cannot be expected that farmers should relinquish their farm to market roads in order to give fishermen roads to recreational areas.

Morrison said "we want a way to get both types of roads without retarding the farm to market road program."

A retroactive bill by Congress to permit the engineers to buy additional land on the Nebraska side would be of "infinite assistance" to this state, he said.

The bill passed by the last Legislature put money from a tax on motorboat fuel into a special fund from which counties could draw on a matching basis.

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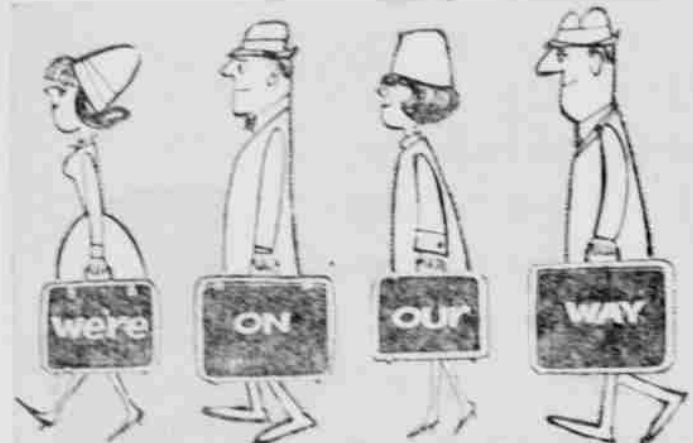


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
