Attention, CAR Owners!

Ordinance No. 999

"Sec. 3. No vehicle shall be permitted to remain or be parked on any street in the City of Plattsmouth, Nebr., for a period of more than 48 consecutive hours without being moved at least once, whether or not such vehicle is capable of being moved under its own power, and any vehicle parked in violation of this provision shall be removed and stored at the expense of the owner thereof upon the order of the Street Commissioner or any member of the Street Dept. of said City, and that it shall be no excuse for any violation of this provision that such vehicle is surrounded by snow or otherwise incapable of being moved."

NOTE: ALSO INCLUDED are cars so-parked even though they are not licensed for the current year.
