EDITORIALS **Electric Cars**

From 1928 until 1961, there were no electrically driven automobiles on the market. There is one electric car on the market today, and it is known as the Henney, offored by the National Union Electric Corporation, at about \$3,650. The range in speed of this vehicle is limited, but it is cheaper to van - less than a cent a mile. Electrics make good taxis or commuter cars. They go only about forty miles an hour, but they have few moving parts and, consequently, service charges are low.

It is interesting to note that in 1898, an electric car held the world's first official land speed record of approximately forty miles per hour. A year later, the record was raised to about sixty-five miles an hour - again it was an electric automobile. Three years later, an electric car raced at the unheard of speed of one hundred and twenty miles per hour, but electrie automobiles have done nothing so spectacular since that time.

There is some speculation that electric cars may return in force. An Englishman by the name of F. T. Bacon has invented a remarkable new power source called the fuel cell.

According to N. W. Purdy, writing in the Atlantic Monthly, it is possible that the fuel cell may bring us an electric automobile in the near future with a range of up to five hundred miles and a speed of up to seventy miles per hour.

pers I found this letter which was written to Elmer when he stayed with his aunt and uncle and worked for Dunlap Construction at Lexington, Nebr., in 1946.

It goes:

"Mr. and Mrs. Gochenour and nephew - Since the nephew told me he was related to John Rice, I recall with considerable interest olden times. Memories about the Rice's and want to write some of them to him for pastime.

"John Rice worked for us on the farm southwest of Plattsmouth about 312 miles. One season in 1874 or 1875. He was about 18 years old and rather small and slender but strong. He had worked the year before near Utica, Seward County, Nebraska for two Jones boys who had fought Indians in Colorado under Colonel Chivington in what was called the Chivington Massacre. They massacred the Indians. He walked most of the way to Platts mouth from Utica.

"Edison Rice was an older brother and not a large fellow, when young was with the Jim Porter's and Wetenkamp's freight train that crossed the plains to Pike's Peak or Larima. A train of Ox teams and wagons. They called it crossing the plains, Indians attack their train once but they fought them off."
