



## Nebraska Banks Show '61 Growth

Federal Reserve member banks in Nebraska experienced a substantial growth in total deposits and in to'al loans during 1961, according to reports of condition released by the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City. Demand deposits at the banks increased \$19 million and time deposits expanded \$53 million during the year. This was a 34 per cent gain in time deposits and was the largest recorded in recent years for member banks in Nebraska

The growth in deposi's coincided with a strong demand for loans, and banks increased the size of their loan portfolios by \$53 million. Major gains were recorded in loans to businesses of \$13 million, nonguaranteed loans to farmers of \$21 million, and single-payment loans to individuals of \$15 million. Although this expansion in
