Please contact Mrs. Jane Pederson, office secretary, or Mrs. Arnold Detmer, Home-making instructor, at the school to make reservations by Friday, April 27. Since only twelve can be cared for at the time, a second play school will be scheduled for May 14, 16, and 18 if there is enough demand.

Twenty-four children were enrolled in Play School in each of the last two years with two sections of twelve each both years.
