ORDINANCE NO. 1026
 AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO ALCOHOLIC LIQUORS AND AMENDING SECTION 5 OF ORDINANCE NO. 885; FIXING THE OCCUPATION TAX UPON LIQUOR LICENSEES IN THE CITY OF PLATTSMOUTH AND REPEALING ORDINANCE NO. 1002.

REPEALING THE ORIGINAL SECTION 5 OF ORDINANCE NO. 885 AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PLATTSMOUTH, NEBRASKA:

SECTION 1. That Section 5 of Ordinance No. 885 be and same is hereby amended to read as follows:

SECTION 5. For the purpose of raising revenue within said City, there is hereby levied upon the following described businesses, including clubs, conducted in said City, the following occupation taxes:

- Beer distributor, the sum of \$150.00 per annum;
- Retailer of beer, (on sale) the sum of \$50.00 per annum;
- Retailer of beer, (off sale only) the sum of \$25.00 per annum;
- Retailer of beer, (on and off sale) the sum of \$150.00 per annum;
- Retailer of alcoholic liquor for consumption on the premises (sale in original package only) the sum of \$25.00 per annum;
- Retailer of alcoholic liquor for consumption on the premises and off the premises, where the licensee is a club limited to members and guests only, the sum of \$100.00 per annum;
- Retailer of alcoholic liquor for consumption on the premises, and off the premises, (sales in original packages only) where licensee is not a club limited to members and guests, the sum of \$375.00 per annum;
- The occupation tax shall commence on the first day of May of each year and end on the 30th day of April next succeeding. No occupation tax in an amount less than the sum provided in this Section for yearly period shall be accepted regardless of the time within the taxing period when such business is commenced and no portion of any tax shall be refunded in the event such licensee ceases the operation of said business after the first day of May nor shall any part thereof be transferable or assignable. The tax levied and imposed by this Section shall in no case exceed twice the amount required to be paid for license for the same period of time under the provisions of the Nebraska Liquor Control Act. The amount of the occupation tax shall be deposited with the City Clerk at the time the application is made or within twenty-four hours after such application has been filed with the Nebraska Liquor Control Commission. The City Clerk shall hold said occupation tax as a trust fund until application is finally passed upon and if the application is refused and license denied, then the amount thereof shall be returned to the applicant. The City Clerk shall account to and pay said occupation tax to the City Treasurer immediately after said license is issued and the Treasurer shall credit the same to the general fund of the City.

SECTION 2 Section 5 of Ordinance No. 885 as amended by Ordinance No. 1002 is hereby repealed.

SECTION 3 This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication as provided by law.
