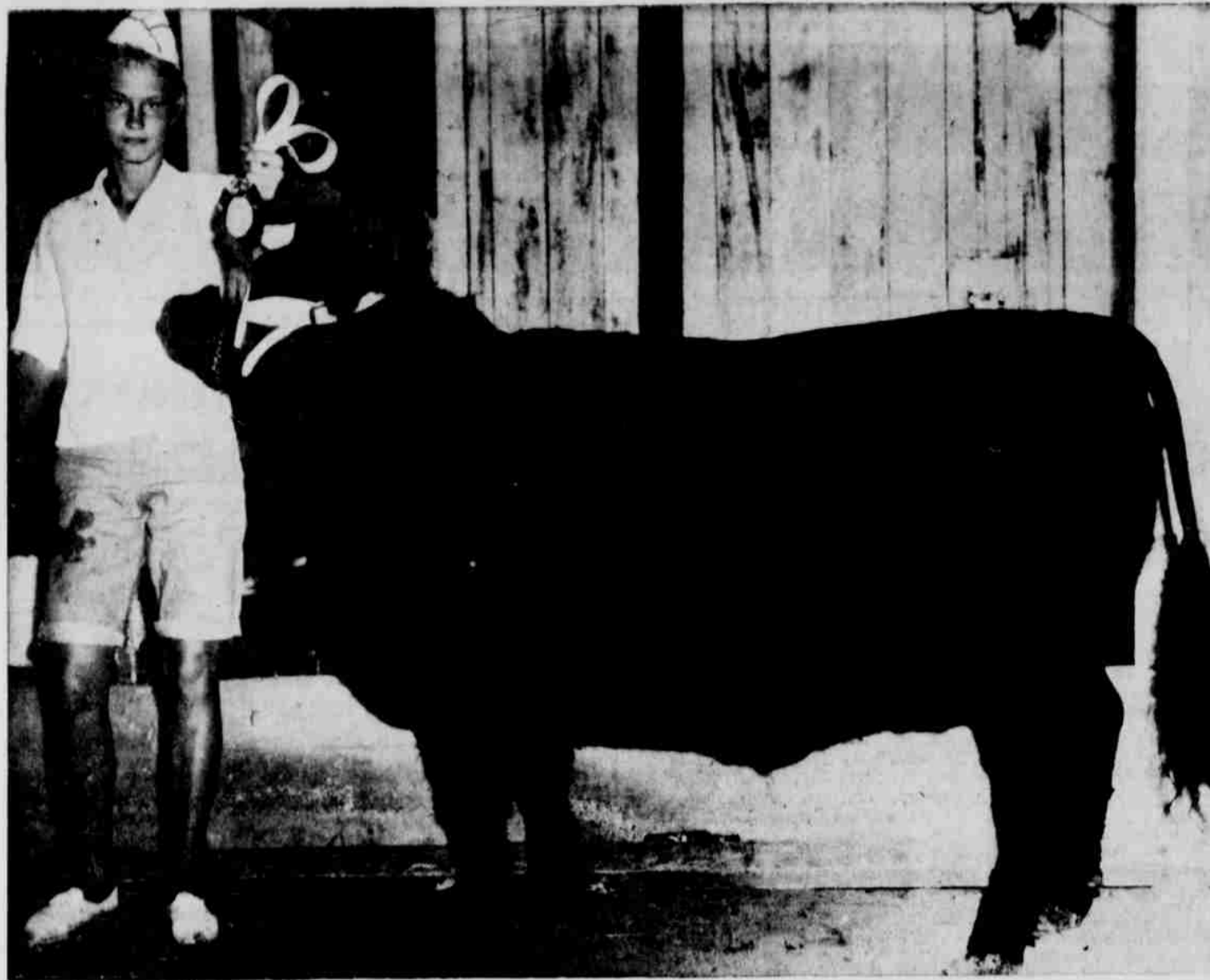

County Seeks Return of Check Forger

A legal tussle between Cass County authorities and Missouri authorities over a man wanted in Cass County moved one step closer to a "showdown" Tuesday in Vernon County, Mo.

L. P. Ames of Missouri is charged in Cass County with issuing five insufficient fund checks May 16, 17 and 18 of this year, totaling \$4,002.20. The checks were in payment for grain purchased in Cass County.

Charges were filed in June and a warrant sent to Missouri authorities for Ames' arrest but Missouri officers refused to act, despite repeated requests from Cass County authorities.

Tuesday, Sheriff Tom Solomon arrived at the Vernon County, Missouri, Courthouse at 8 a.m. on instructions from County Attorney Jim Begley to find out the difficulty. After a day-long legal battle, Solomon got Ames before the Judge on a "fugitive from justice" complaint.

After the court hearing, the Missouri Judge ruled in favor of Cass County and the proceeding was ordered sent to the Governor of Missouri. Extradition proceedings may now be initiated by the Cass County Attorney's office for action through the Nebraska Governor's office.

Solomon said the file in Vernon County, Missouri, includes warrants from seven other counties in three states, all of which were unacted upon. Ames' first arrest came Tuesday afternoon.

Of the \$4,002.20 in checks issued in Cass County \$2,000 of the amount has been recovered to date, the Sheriff said.

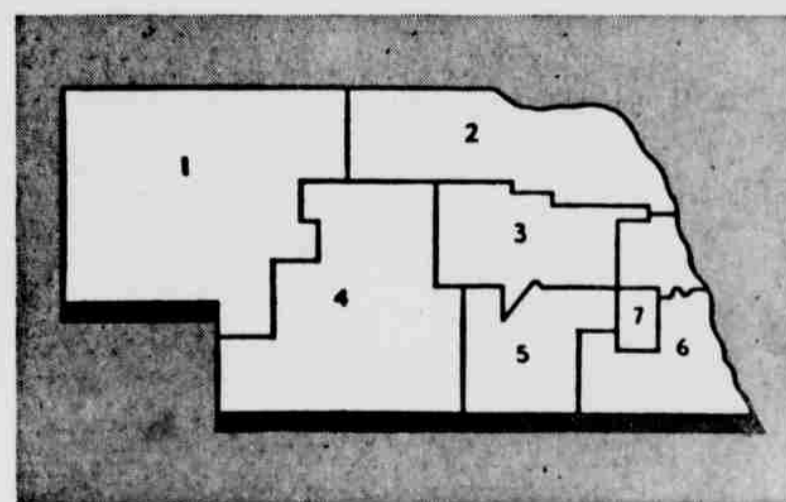

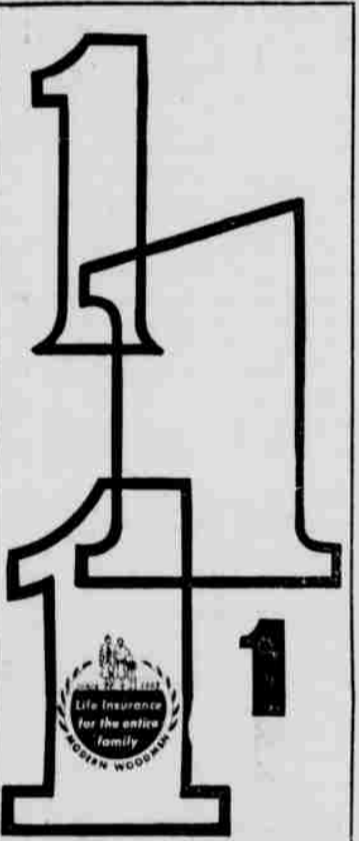

CONSUMERS PUBLIC POWER DISTRICT

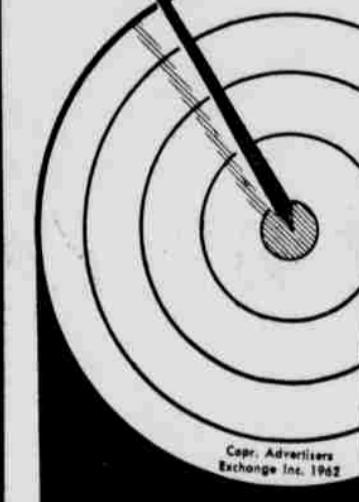
