The Queen and her family are active members of the St. John the Baptist Catholic Church in Plattsmouth. Her father is active in the Knights of Columbus and Holy Name. Her mother is a member of the Altar Society. Carolyn was an active member of CYO while in high school.

Queen Carolyn's life has been filled with scholastic, school, church and community activities.

Ruling over Kornland with Queen Carolyn is King John Joseph Clويد, Jr., son of Plattsmouth natives. He was born July 5, 1919 in Plattsmouth, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Clويد, Sr. He has two sisters, Mrs. A. J. Ulrich, who resides on a farm near Louisville and Mrs. A. E. Chovanec of Aurora, Colo.

In 1947 King John married Winifred Evans of Kenesaw, Neb., who taught for several years in the Plattsmouth School System. They have three children, John J. Clويد III, 12, Monica, 11 and Jeffrey, 7.

He is a member of St. John the Baptist Catholic Church and the Knights of Columbus. He oper-

ates the Clويد Service Station at 205 Main, and resides at 1421 Highland Drive, Plattsmouth.

His maternal grandparents migrated here from Ohio in 1880; his paternal grandparents came here from Germany by way of Pennsylvania, also in 1880.

King John's father was employed by the Burlington Railroad until he entered the lumber business in Plattsmouth and Louisville with his brother August Clويد. In 1934 he established Clويد Service Station in which he was active until retirement. John Clويد Sr. served as City Clerk under Mayor Sattler; headed the Civil Defense here in World War II. For the past ten years he has served on the Board of Public Works of this city. Both Mr. and Mrs. Clويد, Sr. have been prominent in music circles throughout the years.

King John attended St. John's Parochial School and graduated from Plattsmouth High School. He attended Creighton University in Omaha until called into the Armed Services in 1942. After a year's service in the Air Corps, he was commissioned 2nd Lt. of Infantry, in 1943; served in the European Theater of Operations. He holds the Bronze Star Medal for Valor with Oak Leaf Cluster. He returned to civilian life in 1946 and entered business. He is past director and vice president of the Lions Club and the Chamber of Commerce. He is a member of the American Legion, the VFW, the Plattsmouth Volunteer Fire Department and Director of the Plattsmouth Development Corporation. He has served two terms on the Plattsmouth City School Board and is Commander of Company H—355th Regiment

(BCT) United States Army Reserve.
