Westerns Hold Spotlight at Omaha Market

Western replacement cattle and calves continued in the spotlight Monday at Omaha. The stocker and feeder count was 11,500, a total not likely to be equalled again this fall. Scattered lots of calves sold unevenly higher than last week's close, other replacement cattle and calves largely steady.

There were steer calves from \$28 to \$30.50, latter 365-pound Nebraska; heifer calves at \$29-\$33, top money for Wyoming weighing 370. There were stock and feeder heifers weighing 950-925 at \$24-\$25.75.

Replacement steers ranged from \$24 to \$30, the high figure for Wyoming weighing 511-541. Weights to 680 and 680 commanded \$29; to 800, \$27; to 930, \$25.50. Stock cows went out at \$14-\$17.

Fat cattle started the week steady to mostly 25c higher, better steers and heifers as much as 50c up. There were steers to \$29.75 and \$30, heifers to \$28.25 and \$28.50, and mixed yearlings, mostly heifers, at \$28.75. Other steers and yearlings were bracketed at \$25-\$29.50, other heifers at \$25-\$28. Plainer cattle \$24.50 down. A two-load drove of 1500-pound heifers sold at \$25.

Cows sold steady to 25c off, most canners and cutters \$11-\$13.50, beef cows on up to \$16.

Fat lambs were 50c lower, feeder lambs steady, woolled and shorn slaughter lambs \$17-\$19.50. Western feeder lambs \$17.50-\$18.50, latter weighing 64. Slaughter ewes held at \$3.50-\$6.75.

Butcher hogs—on a run of 21-000, largest for a Monday since last April—sold 25-75c lower, mostly 25-50c off, weights from 190-300, \$15.50-\$16.75. Sows, 25-50c down, sold from \$13.75-\$15.25—their weight range 300-600.
