 feating Dr. B. H. Baer of Ashland, 3,743 to 2,806. Voting was in parts of Cass, Sargey and Saunders Counties.

Other County officers re-elected without opposition were County Clerk Land, Republican; Register of Deeds Lucille Horne Gaines, Democrat; Clerk of District Court C. E. Ledgway, Republican; Treasurer Gwen Scodes, Republican; Surveyor William Coakley, Republican; District 3 Commissioner Herman Barnemeier of Elmwood, Republican; and, on the non-political ballot, H. Neil Lancaster, County Superintendent of Schools.

Land's 5,026 vote total was the biggest.

Cass County gave Governor Morrison a 3,103 to 2,687 margin over Fred Seaton and supported Republican Congressman Glenn Cunningham 3,472 to 2,085 over Thomas Bonner.

County officers-elect will be sworn in Jan. 3, statute calling for that ceremony on the first Thursday after the first Tuesday in January New Year's Day falls on Tuesday.

Manley Navy Man in Antarctica

McMURDO SOUND, Antarctica—Wallace A. Switzer, airman, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gerold R. Switzer of Manley, Neb., is taking part in the Antarctic undertaking "Operation Deepfreeze 63", at McMurdo Sound, Antarctica.

He is one of nearly 100 men in the Navy, making up his unit, which will perform duties in support of the scientific parties in the frozen wasteland, placing and resupplying them through the four months of continuous daylight.

This season will be perhaps the most ambitious phase of Deepfreeze operations on record.

Personnel stationed at McMurdo already have experienced some of the warmest weather the continent ever sees—a balmy 15 degrees above zero—and a "whiteout" where the ground and air blend in a white, fog-like condition that makes flight almost impossible.

Christmas Seal Plans Underway

Plans are well underway for the annual Christmas Seal Campaign to raise funds to wipe out tuberculosis and other respiratory diseases.

"A lot of work goes into the Christmas Seal Campaign", said Mrs. Marion Wiles Cass County Christmas Seal Chairman. The amount of work it takes volunteers just to check the mailing list and prepare 3,000 letters for mailing is amazing.

"Contributing to Christmas Seals gives everyone a chance to make our community a safe, healthy place to live. We can decide what we want to do to help when we receive our Christmas Seal letter."

Mrs. Wiles asked that this year's letter be read carefully by everyone. "The 56th Annual Christmas Seal Campaign letter announces another step in tuberculosis control. We are now aiming for total eradication of TB. At the same time we are aiming

to control other respiratory diseases which rank fourth among all causes of death in the United States today. These other respiratory diseases, such as bronchitis, asthma, and emphysema complicate the detection and treatment of TB.

Mrs. Wiles emphasized that TB is still the major infectious disease in the United States.

"Eradication means finding and treating those who have TB before they can infect others." Christmas Seals will be in the

mail on November 13, according to Mrs. John E. Schutz, publicity chairman of Cass County TB organization.
